



**1898**  
St John of God Subiaco Hospital opened on 19 April. Buildings comprised a 30 bed hospital, theatre, doctor's room, convent, chapel and school.

**1902**  
A new convent improved accommodation for the Sisters of St John of God. The original convent was converted to hospital wards, increasing bed numbers to 40.



**1922**  
Cambridge Street Wing opened, providing Nightingale style wards on the first two floors with private rooms on the third floor. The hospital now had 130 beds.

**1911**  
The School of Nursing opened for Sisters of St John of God, who undertook training for qualifications of membership of the Australian Trained Nurses Association.

**1912 - 1916**  
New wings completed (wards 1 & 2).

**1914**  
First x-ray department established.

*"On entering the large reception hall there is no fuss, there is no worrying questioning or delay. The patients are immediately taken to their allotted wards, which may be a luxuriously furnished single room, a two, three or four-bed room, or one of the big wards holding some forty to fifty patients."*

**1932/33**  
Completion of the Connolly Street Wing was the first stage of the central block linking the 1912-16 and 1922 buildings.

**1933**  
Pathology commenced testing on the wards.

**1948**  
The first pathology laboratory opened in a room on St Peter's Ward.

**1949**  
A Midwifery Training School was established for Sisters of St John of God.

**1956**  
Memorial Chapel completed and Pathology Department established.

**1960s**  
Services expanded with a new radiological centre, a psychiatric ward, nuclear medicine and a theatre recovery room.

**1961**  
Maternity services expanded with the opening of a dedicated 100 bed maternity hospital. The hospital now had 375 beds.

**1969**  
A new Pathology Building opened on 9 June. Departments included a blood bank and bone tumour registry.

**1978**  
The St John of God Medical Centre opened in the former Nurses' Quarters.

**1980s**  
The Medical Teaching Unit and the Pastoral Care Department were established. Specialist colonoscopy and laser clinics opened, along with a cardiology clinic and a dedicated oncology ward. A drop-in mother and baby centre added to the hospital's growing services.

**1989**  
St John of God Health Care was established, bringing the Sisters of St John of God's services in Western Australia, Victoria and New South Wales together.

**1990**  
Opening of the South Wing provided new general and maternity wards and delivery suites, along with intensive care and day surgery units. The hospital now had 360 beds.

**1993**  
The last group of nurses graduated from the School of Midwifery before training moved to the university system. The School of Nursing had closed in 1984.

**1998**  
Subiaco Clinic opened, providing 121 medical suites, a fully integrated day surgery unit and conference centre.

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**2000s**  
Outreach services expanded with the introduction of the Drug and Alcohol Withdrawal Network and a Raphael Centre to help families affected by pre and post-natal depression. New in-hospital services included the establishment of a cancer centre, continence centre, new day surgery unit and short stay ward. The hospital now had 448 beds.

**2006**  
St John of God Chapel was blessed and opened on 10 March.

**2007**  
The first stage of the Bendat Family Comprehensive Cancer Clinic opened. The centre was completed in 2009.

**2010s**  
Surgical advances continue with the installation of WA's first da Vinci surgical robot in 2011 and a Stryker orthopaedic robot in 2015. The neonatal special care unit also opened, providing specialised medical support to babies born prematurely or unwell. The hospital now has 555 beds.

**2015**  
St John of God Wembley Day Surgery opened.

**2018**  
Celebrated 120 years of caring for the Western Australian community. A new Clinical Command Centre opened to optimise patient flow through theatres.
